PRESIDENT'S REPORT

To the Members,

The Chapter's year end was changed to the 30th June to bring us into line with Jaycee South Africa. The Council has operated for only ten months instead of the usual twelve. In spite of the shorter year, we managed to surpass last year's good record and accomplish several outstanding successes.

My Plans at the beginning of my year of office were:

- 1. To cut down the number of projects and increase the scope and level of those undertaken.
- To completely re-direct our project activity and concentrate mainly on Youth and Community Development.
- 3. To maintain and consolidate our new found financial stability.
- 4. To develop the Chapter's public image by means of an intensive public relations programme.
- To revitalise meetings and social functions and develop a strong sense of co-operation and team spirit amongst members.

I believe these objectives were achieved. At the Transvaal Sub-Convention, this Chapter won the J.O. Markovitz Award for the project best serving the Ideals and purposes of Jaycee (Project Medical Aid to the Homelands) and the premiére Award — the Vice President Transvaal Award for the most outstanding Chapter Programme.

Project activity underwent a distinct change this past year. Economic Affairs was no longer the most active Portfolio. More than 50% of the projects were in the field of Youth and Community Development. Our community work gave us the opportunity of working closely with such organisations as the Department of Information, The Department of Cultural Advancement and M.O.T.H. Our programme had the specific objective of improving the social, spiritual and economic well-being of the Community. This trend was most rewarding and is a positive fulfilment of the purposes of Jaycee.

The Chapter's financial position is very healthy. Income for the past ten months exceeded R30,000 (excluding "Operation Kliptown"). We have budgeted to collect a further R16,000 (with expenditure of R4,000) before the end of the year. The incoming officers will have ample funds for the running of the Chapter when they assume their duties.

The Chapter's public image grew considerably during the past ten months. We became fully involved in all aspects of our Community. Our views on topical issues were quoted in the Press and on Radio. "The Star" devoted three full pages to us in a supplement on the Chapter on Jaycee Day.

Growth this year has been substantial and Membership has increased by 25%. We are launching a Chapter in the Southern Suburbs which should be in operation by the end of the year. Our extension to Klerksdorp will be applying for full affiliation to Jaycee South Africa at our National Convention in August.

The National Convention this year is being run by this Chapter and has already created an all time record. The Convention was fully booked three months in advance. Internal activity also reached new heights with 75% of members attending meetings and working on projects.

Before reviewing the various commissions, I would like to mention those individuals who contributed to the outstanding success of the Chapter. John Ferrans as Vice President Programmes was unstinting in his loyalty and support while Ronnie Tanur created a major impact in our Public Relations programme. Jacky Schnaid as Treasurer maintained an extremely efficient system of finance and helped make the year financially strong. I would also like to thank my other Executive Officers, John Hare and Peter Targett for their efforts.

Our Patrons must be congratulated and thanked for their tremendous moral and financial support. Their involvement helped this Chapter maintain its position as foremost in the Country.

PROGRAMMES (Vice President John Ferrans)

Community Development (Rupert Lawlor)

This portfolio was highly active this year. "Medical Aid to the Homelands" has collected nearly R8 000 and has already won an Award. "Operation Kliptown" has finally got off the ground and the New Year will see our Nursery School fully operating. "How to Stretch Your Rand" was extremely popular and requests for repeat lectures have been received.

Youth and Education (Gill Lloyd)

"Tomorrow's Leaders" created much interest in schools throughout the province and will become a permanent feature. "Spirit of Christmas" grew into a major undertaking and 10,000 under-privileged children benefited. "Project Wildlife" was highly successful and will soon be run on a National basis.

International Relations (Danny Klopper)

Less projects were run than last year but the Chapter has contributed significantly to building South Africa's image abroad. "Radio Jaycee" was a novel and successful innovation. Contact with organisations throughout the world was established. The visit of James A. Michener was a major success.

Economic Affairs (Jurgen Stocker)

This portfolio lost its top position in the Chapter and concentrated on running courses such as "Better Secretaries" Course, "Telephone Users" Seminar and "The Changing Value of Money". These courses made substantial profits for the Chapter.

DEVELOPMENT (Vice President John Hare)

Membership (Rod Cheeseman)

Extremely hard work by Rod Cheeseman, who ran two Orientation evenings per month, helped the Chapter grow by 25%. More than 80 new members joined the Organisation during the last ten months.

Leadership Development

This commission was not particularly well supported but certain courses were very popular. Jennifer Weitzman has made Effective Speaking one of our strong points. Leadership in Action, Creative Thinking and Method Dynamics were very successful.

Functions (Joan Braude)

Jaycees were well entertained during the past year. Cocktail Hours drew more than 50% of the members and saw such well known Guest Speakers as Taubie Kushlick, Charles Fortune and Robin Alexander. Induction Dinners were particularly well run.

Extension (Harry Hambly)

Klerksdorp Junior Chamber of Commerce is overcoming its initial problems and will soon be a full member of Jaycee South Africa. After a slow start our extension to the South is beginning to take shape and the New Year will see a Chapter operating in the suburbs.

Mrs. Isabel Shur will be leaving our employ at the end of August to have a baby. She ran our Secretariat efficiently and economically. The Chapter will sorely miss her.

Having a National President from this Chapter was always a tremendous help. Senator Gerald Leissner was always a great help to me as was Senator Manny Gerson whose advice and help was invaluable. I am sorry that the Immediate Past President Wolfgang Munczinski left the country before the year was out. I would have liked to have thanked him personally for his encouragement and advice.

I think our success this year was largely due to our early planning. Within three weeks of taking office, comprehensive and detailed plans were worked out. These were continually reviewed and updated and gave the Executive direction and guidance. My deepest gratitude is owed to the fine group of young men and women who are the members of the Johannesburg Junior Chamber of Commerce and their employers who allowed them to devote so much time to our Community.

TREASURER'S REPORT FOR TEN MONTHS ENDED 30TH JUNE, 1972

The Chapter has once again had a successful financial year, the accounts reflecting a surplus of R1 907, for the ten months ended 30th June, 1972. A projection of this surplus for a twelve month period would increase this surplus to R2 224, as compared to the 1971 surplus of R1 729.

The salient feature of these accounts is that although project and membership income is increasing, cost of administration, entertainment and functions has risen out of proportion to income. This has been largely due to the increase in salaries and costs of printing and stationery. Entertainment expenses have increased four-fold because it was decided not to charge members for cocktail hour and to give all entertainment at cost. Increased cost is the uncomfortable phenomenon of the present economic situation in which we find ourselves. Although we accept spiralling costs as inevitable, the Chapter should endeavour to increase project income in line with the increase in costs of running these projects.

The outstanding financial success of the 1972 financial year was the collection of over R7 500, for the Medical Aid to the Homelands Project. The money collected for this project has not been reflected in the Income and Expenditure Account, as the entire proceeds will be spent on the project. A provision for this expenditure has been created in the accounts. Other successful fund raising projects were the Sale of Diaries, Patrons, How to be a Better Secretary, James Michener, Telephone Users Course, Changing Value of Money and Smash the Computer.

I would like to express my appreciation to all Chapter Members for their assistance in having made my term of office smooth and enjoyable.
